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SPANISH FUTURIST PARTY ESCALATES INSTITUTIONAL CAMPAIGN WITH 21 FORMAL PETITIONS AND NEW UN AI GOVERNANCE PROPOSALS

Alianza Futurista asks Spain to support binding international governance of frontier AI, a permanent UN Existential Risk Observatory and an intergovernmental Alliance of Democracies, while filing 20 parallel petitions to regulate human cryopreservation across Spain.

Madrid, Spain — 10 August 2026 — One month after addressing the United Nations, the European Parliament and the Spanish Government with a coordinated set of proposals on frontier AI governance, existential risk, democratic cooperation and emerging technologies, Spanish political party and think tank Alianza Futurista has moved from **institutional letters to formal legal petitions**.

On 10 August, the party filed **21 formal petitions under Spain's constitutional Right of Petition**. Twenty seek the regulation of human cryopreservation: one before each of Spain's 17 autonomous communities, one before Ceuta, one before Melilla and one before the President of the Government. The twenty-first, addressed to Spain's Minister of Foreign Affairs, asks the Government to state whether Spain will support **binding international governance of frontier AI**, a **permanent United Nations Existential Risk Observatory** and an **intergovernmental Alliance of Democracies**.

At the same time, Alianza Futurista submitted a [written stakeholder contribution to the United Nations Global Dialogue on AI Governance](#) and sent a [detailed follow-up to the European Parliament](#) identifying questions from its July initiative that it believes remain unanswered.

From dialogue to binding governance of frontier AI

The [formal petition to Spain's Minister of Foreign Affairs](#) asks what position Spain took at the inaugural session of the UN Global Dialogue on AI Governance in Geneva on 6–7 July 2026 and whether it will support moving, in due course, from dialogue toward **binding international frameworks** for the most advanced AI systems.

Specifically, Alianza Futurista asks Spain to support international arrangements that include **minimum safety standards, transparency requirements and mandatory incident reporting** for frontier AI; to state its position on a permanent UN body for existential risks; and to state whether it would promote or support a structured intergovernmental Alliance of Democracies. The petition also asks the Ministry to transmit the party's 6 July letter to Spain's Permanent Mission to the United Nations.

A submission to the new UN Global Dialogue on AI Governance

Alianza Futurista's UN submission proposes an **international body for the governance of frontier AI** with an ambition analogous to that of the International Atomic Energy Agency; binding agreements among states on safety, transparency and incident reporting; and formal participation by civil-society organisations, independent researchers and international scientific bodies.

It also proposes a **permanent Existential Risk Observatory within the United Nations**: an interdisciplinary body tasked with monitoring, assessing and issuing public alerts on risks that could threaten the long-term survival or well-being of humanity and other sentient species. The party asks that the proposal be brought to the attention of the Independent International Scientific Panel on AI and requests information on accreditation to participate as a stakeholder in the Dialogue's second session in New York in May 2027.

European Parliament: answering the questions that remain

The European Parliament replied to Alianza Futurista on 20 July. The party welcomed the response, but its new follow-up argues that several of its specific proposals were answered with descriptions of existing EU policy rather than with positions on the proposals themselves.

On artificial intelligence, the follow-up notes that the Parliament's reply discussed European investment and technological sovereignty but did not address **frontier systems, systemic risk, incident reporting or international coordination**. Alianza Futurista therefore repeats its central question: whether the European Parliament considers that frontier AI requires a **binding international framework beyond the internal application of the EU AI Act**, and whether it is willing to ask the Commission and the High Representative to raise the issue in multilateral forums, including the United Nations.

The follow-up also asks whether Parliament has ever formally considered an **Alliance of Democracies**; whether the current EU process for authorising cultivated meat is proportionate and sufficiently agile; whether the cross-border dimension of human cryopreservation has been assessed separately from national authorisation; and whether

Parliament will support **dedicated biogerontology and healthy-lifespan research funding in FP10**.

Twenty cryopreservation petitions: a concrete test of formal accountability

The European Parliament's reply stated, in relation to cryopreservation, that the European Commission had concluded that the issues raised currently fall outside EU competences and remain primarily the responsibility of Member States. Alianza Futurista responded by taking that conclusion literally: it filed **20 formal petitions across Spain** — 19 before the autonomous communities and cities and one before the national Government.

The petitions ask public authorities to recognise and regulate cryopreservation as a lawful option for informed adults. In **16 of Spain's 17 autonomous communities**, the relevant rule on the final disposition of a body is an executive decree that can potentially be amended without a parliamentary vote; in Murcia it is a health department order. The national petition also asks for a basic nationwide framework and clearer international transport procedures while no cryopreservation facilities are available in Spain.

Because the petitions were filed under Organic Law 4/2001 on the Right of Petition, they trigger formal procedural obligations: acknowledgement within **ten days** and, once admitted, a reasoned reply within a maximum of **three months**. Alianza Futurista says it will publish the responses and publicly track compliance.

What Alianza Futurista is asking institutions to do

- **Create binding international governance for frontier AI**, including minimum safety, transparency and incident-reporting requirements.
- **Establish a permanent UN Existential Risk Observatory** with a public monitoring and early-warning role across major global catastrophic risks.
- **Create an intergovernmental Alliance of Democracies** as a structured forum for cooperation among democratic states.
- **Give independent science and civil society a formal role** in international AI governance rather than leaving it exclusively to governments and major technology companies.
- **Turn general commitments into concrete policy decisions** on frontier AI, longevity science, cultivated meat, cryopreservation and other transformative technologies.

A second phase of a broader campaign

The 10 August actions follow three institutional letters sent on 6 July to the UN Secretary-General, the President of the European Parliament and the President of the Government of Spain. Alianza Futurista describes the new filings as a shift from putting proposals on the table to **requiring formal institutional answers where the law provides a mechanism to do so**.
